



Am I free to leave?




## I <u>do not consent</u> to a search.\*

\*Warrants, consent, or warrantless search in exigent circumstances





## Know Your Rights: ICE Encounters





#### If ICE comes to your home ...


Do not open the door.

Only open the door if the agent has a <u>valid</u> warrant signed by a judge.

Otherwise, say, I <u>do not consent to your entry</u>.

## If ICE comes to your workplace ...



You can keep working.





# If ICE approaches you in a <u>public area</u> of your workplace ...

You have the right to remain silent.


Ask: Am I free to leave? If yes, calmly walk away. If not, say, "I want to speak with an attorney. I'm exercising my right to remain silent."



#### If ICE stops you on the street...

Ask: Am I free to leave?

If yes, calmly walk away. If not, say, "I want to speak with an attorney. I'm exercising my right to remain silent."





## If ICE tries to search you or your belongings ...

Say, "I don't consent to this search."





### Things to avoid when interacting with ICE ...

Don't tell ICE your country of origin.
Don't present an ID/driver's license
unless you are pulled over by driving.
Don't sign anything.

Don't carry false documents.

Don't lie.

Don't resist, obstruct, or fight.


## Know Your Rights while Protesting





### What are our rights while protesting?

The U.S. and New Mexico
Constitutions protect the right
to free speech and expression no matter how offensive its
content





### What are our rights while protesting?

Free speech protects most of what we say.





### What are our rights while protesting?

Protected speech includes things like: A shirt with "Fuck the Draft." Chanting political slogans. Booing.





### Can the government restrict protests?

Yes - time, place, and manner







## Does the right to free speech protect *all* speech?

The U.S. Constitution does not protect targeted, discriminatory harassment; incitement to violence; or true threats.





#### What is civil disobedience?

Occupying government buildings, blocking traffic, or engaging in other unlawful activities.

Civil disobedience is not protected by the U.S. Constitution. That means you can be arrested if you engage in it. But sometimes that's the point.



# What can we do to reduce harm if the police show up at a protest?

Prepare yourself. Take a deep breath.

If it escalates: "Am I being detained?"

If yes, "I am exercising my right to remain silent. I want to speak to a lawyer."



#### What can we do to reduce harm if we're arrested?

Remember: police lie. Don't trust anything they say.

Immediately say, "I'm exercising my right to remain silent. I want a lawyer now. \*"

\*It may take days or weeks to see a lawyer. Stay silent.





Remember: You can film and photograph police operating outdoors in public.



#### If you are arrested ...

Do not resist arrest—even if you believe the arrest is unfair.

Follow officers' commands even if they are rude or unjust.



#### If you are arrested ...

If you can't afford a lawyer, you have the right to be provided with one for free.

Don't say anything, sign anything, or make decisions without a lawyer.

You have the right to make a local phone call.






Cassian Andor (he/him), a resident of Ferrix City—a city in New Mexico—is organizing a protest to demand affordable housing.

Cassian has experienced the housing crisis firsthand. Last year, his landlord Luthen Rael raised his rent from \$1,200 to \$1,600. Plus, Luthen didn't return Cassian's security deposit. Like Luthen needs the extra cash!


Now, Cassian stays on a couch at his mom's apartment.


